Summer Term 2

Dialogue and encounter

- Teachers may want to begin this branch by looking at the Jewish Passover.
- For Christians, the feast of the Passover is important because they believe that it links with Jesus' last meal with his disciples. In the gospels of St Matthew, St Mark, and St Luke, the Last Supper is a Passover meal.
- Pupils may be able to make simple connections between the Last Supper,
 Passover, and the sharing of unleavened bread and wine at Mass and
 Jesus' instruction to 'Do this in memory of me'.
- For Christians, Jesus offers himself as the sacrifice (he is the Paschal lamb)
 and his death and resurrection save people from sin and restore the way
 to a relationship with God in this life and in heaven. Jesus commands the
 disciples to remember and repeat his actions as he establishes a new
 promise (covenant).

Religious Education

As always, encountering other religious beliefs should be a first-hand experience where possible, allowing people to speak about their religious beliefs.

- Pupils may need some contextual understanding to know that the festival
 of Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) celebrates the liberation of the Hebrew
 people from slavery in Egypt.
- In the book of Exodus, the Passover happens at the beginning of a new era for the Jewish people when they are saved from slavery by God and set free.
- Some simple facts about how the Jewish festival of the Passover is celebrated by Jews in Britain today.
- On the evening before Passover starts, Jewish families have a special service called a Seder which takes place over a meal. The story of Exodus is read from a book called the Haggadah. Different family members read parts of the story (some parts are read in Hebrew) and food and drink with symbolic meaning is placed upon the table.

English Reading	The Iron Man by Ted Hughes & Chris Mould Children will be checking that the text makes sense to them, discussing their understanding and explaining the meaning of words in context. They will be asking questions to improve their understanding of a text by discussing words and phrases that capture the reader's interest and imagination. Reading books that are structured in different ways and reading for a range of purposes. Pupils will be encouraged to draw inferences such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions, and justifying inferences with evidence. They will also predict what might happen from details stated and implied.
English Spelling, Punctuation, Grammar	 Expressing time, place and cause using conjunctions [for example, when, before, after, while, so, because], adverbs [for example, then, next, soon, therefore], or prepositions [for example, before, after, during, in, because of] Text Introduction to paragraphs as a way to group related material Headings and sub-headings to aid presentation Use of the present perfect form of verbs instead of the simple past [for example, He has gone out to play contrasted with He went out to play
English Writing	The children will write an Unexpected Arrival Narrative and a Trap Explanation. They will be discussing writing similar to that which they are planning to write in order to understand and learn from its structure, vocabulary and grammar. They will also be: discussing and recording ideas organising paragraphs around a theme in narratives, creating settings, characters and plot in non-narrative material, using simple organisational devices [for example, headings and sub-headings]
Science	Animals including humans - nutrition The children will identify the different types of food groups. They will recognise and understand why humans need a healthy and varied diet. They will also investigate the different foods that animals eat.
History	The Roman Empire and its effect on Britain The children will learn to describe how and why the Romans invaded Britain using a range of historical sources. They will be able to discuss artefacts, the role of Boudicca, causes and consequences. They will also work to share information they learn about the Romanisation of Britain with their peers in an appropriate format.
Physical Education	Tennis In this unit pupils develop the key skills required for tennis such as the ready position, racket control and hitting a ball. They learn how to score points and how to use skills, simple strategies and tactics to outwit the opposition. Pupils are given opportunities to play games independently and are taught the importance of being honest whilst playing to the rules. Dance

	Pupils create dances in relation to an idea including historical and scientific stimuli. Pupils work individually, with a partner and in small groups, sharing their ideas. Pupils develop their use of counting and rhythm. Pupils learn to use canon, unison, formation and levels in their dances. They will be given the opportunity to perform to others and provide feedback using key terminology.
Computing	Spreadsheets The children will use 2Calculate to collect data and produce a variety of graphs. They will learn the symbols for more than, less than and equal to, to compare values and will use the advanced mode of 2Calculate to learn about cell references.
Art and Design	Mosaics The children will spend time researching and making their own mosaic inspired by images of Roman Mosaics. They will engage with a range of skills including selecting and handling materials. Children will evaluate their work and spend time discussing their work and their peers work as a class.
Design and Technology	Mechanical Systems - Levers & Linkages The children will design their information book, linking to the volcanoes topic studied earlier in the year.
PSHE	Physical health and wellbeing – What helps me choose? Children will be able to name up to 5 healthy food and drink choices. They will know that branding can affect people's food choices and they will explore 5 ways of keeping active and state some challenges linked to this.
